Twenty years ago Rural Tractors of Lilydale was a one man show. Tom Mit-chell began with premises in Hutchinson Street with one tractor and three farm attachments valued about \$1,800.

Today the staff numbers more than 30 and nine men operating six service vans work exclusively on outside field maintenance pa-

In 1951 he became the first farm machinery agent provide agricultural equipment on a hire basis.

Tom had looked around him and seen men who had returned from the war struggling to establish themselves on the often virgin farmlands of the outlying districts.



Usually without much and förced to plough the little they made back into their farms to consolidate their foothold, they couldn't afford to buy their equipment outright and welcomed the chance to hire it.

Tom incorporated a real estate agency in his op-erations in 1953 and later became even more involved in the town of his birth as a shire councillor—for nine years—and president of the Lilydale football and swimming clubs.

He retains his real estate connections through the firm of Mitchell and Batten who recently moved into new offices in Main

He is also a director and ex-chairman of directors of David Mitchell Estates as well as a Justice of the Peace of long standing.
